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Adverse Childhood Experiences Alcoholic Parents

of reported adverse experiences increases regardless of parental alcohol abuse. Depression among adult children of alcoholics appears to be largely, if not solely, due to the greater likelihood of having had adverse childhood experiences in a home with alcohol-abusing parents. The number of adverse experiences had a graded relationship to alcoholism and depression in adulthood, independent of parental alcohol abuse. The prevalence of alcoholism was higher among persons who reported parental alcohol abuse, no matter how many adverse experiences they reported. The association between parental alcohol abuse and depression was accounted for by the higher risk of having adverse childhood experiences in alcoholic families.

An estimated 25 percent of U.S. children are exposed to alcohol abuse or dependence in the family (1).

A parent's drinking – a child's adverse childhood experiences is a connection that's often missed. Sadly, this missed connection can cause a child to develop an alcohol use disorder or marry someone with an alcohol use disorder or develop a host of physical and emotional ailments that can last a lifetime (described below).

Having an alcoholic parent increases a child's risk of being physically, sexually or emotionally abused, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Adverse Childhood Experiences study. Emotional neglect is common in an alcoholic household.

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and alcohol misuse have been recognized globally as key public health issues (WHO, 2006, 2010). ACEs refer to stressful events which an individual experiences in childhood, such as physical abuse, parental divorce or parental alcoholism (WHO, 2015).

In fact, childhood abuse tends to be highly interrelated with other adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), such as growing up with parents impaired by alcohol or drugs, domestic violence, parental marital discord, mental illness in the home, and crime (Felitti et al., 1998). Therefore, improvements in the understanding of alcohol abuse need to take into account the tendency for these experiences to be clustered together and their interaction with other familial factors.

Adverse childhood experiences and personal alcohol abuse ...

In a survey conducted in the early 1990s, 2 parental alcoholism was treated as an adverse childhood event rather than as a potential confounder, despite the genetic contribution to alcoholism already evident at the time. 47 Given the accumulated evidence that alcohol dependence has a substantial heritable component, 9,48 we conceptualized familial alcoholism as a potential confounder, and consequently controlled for this to more accurately determine the effects of adverse childhood events.

Adverse Childhood Events and Lifetime Alcohol Dependence

Exposure to childhood ACEs can increase the later risk of: Child abuse (emotional, physical, sexual) Child neglect (emotional, physical) Parent or household mental illness. Parent or household substance use/alcoholism. Witnessing domestic violence. Having a parent or family member in jail; Parent separation or divorce

Childhood adversity—such as child abuse, exposure to violence, family alcohol or drug abuse, and poverty—can have negative, long-term impacts on health and well being (1, 2). Nearly half of U.S. children have experienced at least one adverse childhood event (3, 4).

Even among that population, more than 1 in 5 reported at least three ACEs. The study revealed that “exposure to abuse or household dysfunction during childhood” was a risk factor for seven leading causes of death in adults. It also led to alcohol and drug abuse, suicide, unintended pregnancies, fractures, burns and sexually transmitted diseases.
