Colorectal Cancer Screening (COL) Assesses adults 50-75 who had appropriate screening for colorectal cancer with any of the

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following tests: annual fecal occult blood test, flexible sigmoidoscopy every 5 years, colonoscopy every 10 years, computed tomography colonography every 5 years, stool DNA test every 3 years.

### **Colorectal Cancer Screening and Prevention - American ...**

Colorectal screening procedures have an important role in

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preventing colorectal cancer. Screening can detect precancerous polyps and removal can be done before the polyps become cancerous. Screening also identifies cancer early in the course of the disease when treatment is more effective and the chance of recovery is higher.

The ACS recommends that people at average risk\* of colorectal cancer start regular screening at age 45. This can be done either with a sensitive test that looks for signs of cancer in a person's stool (a stool-based test), or with an exam that looks at the colon and rectum (a visual exam). These options are listed below.

Balance of Benefits and Harms. The USPSTF concludes with high certainty that the net benefit of screening for colorectal cancer is

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substantial. The USPSTF concludes with moderate certainty that the net benefit of screening for colorectal cancer in adults aged 76 to 85 y who have been previously screened is small.

Colorectal Cancer Screening Tests Screening is the process of looking for cancer in people who have no symptoms. Several tests can be used to screen for colorectal cancer (see American Cancer Society Guideline for Colorectal Cancer Screening). The most important thing is to get screened, no matter which test you choose.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) considers the following methods to be acceptable screening tests for colorectal cancer: Stool tests. Both polyps and colorectal cancers can

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bleed, and stool tests check for tiny amounts of blood in feces (stool) that cannot be seen visually.
