The identified psychosocial interventions that directly allowed people with dementia to leave a legacy were life story work and reminiscence therapy. In most cases, this materialised as a tangible document, such as, a life story book, which contained photographs, text, postcards, letters and memorabilia [18].

Exploring psychosocial interventions for people with ...

Psychosocial interventions may include educating people about their condition. Alternately, standard psychotherapy or other schools of therapy may be part of psychosocial interventions. It should be noted that any form of therapy would only be one aspect of interventions. To fully help the individual or group, other interventions are planned.

Eligible interventions were any community-based psychosocial intervention delivered to people with schizophrenia or their caregivers with the aim of improving patient outcomes (see Additional file 1). Studies set in urban and rural locations were included.

A variety of psychosocial interventions were utilised with the majority employing Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT), psychoeducation and social skills training. The core outcomes used to examine the efficacy of the intervention were internalised stigma, self-esteem, empowerment, and functioning.

Psychosocial interventions for internalised stigma in ...

Psychosocial interventions address both the primary symptoms of the mental health problem and the secondary experiences which arise as a consequence of the mental health problem; as such PSIs are a person-based intervention rather than a solely symptom-based treatment.

Discussion: Psychosocial interventions had a positive impact on carer outcomes; however, these results should be interpreted with caution, given the significant level of heterogeneity in study designs. Future research could examine contextual and implementation mechanisms underlying psychosocial interventions to develop effective support systems for family carers of people with dementia.

Through a systematic literature review and meta-analysis, the study authors, led by Lindsay Bornheimer, found that psychosocial interventions—or "nonpharmacological therapeutic interventions that address the psychological, social, personal, relational, or vocational problems associated with mental disorders"—significantly reduced suicidal ideation, planning, and deaths for this population.

Psychosocial Interventions Reduce Suicidality in Psychosis

As Tony's case illustrates, psychosocial interventions with clients who have HIV related neuropsychiatric impairment require the use of a variety of skills.
